GENERAL DESCRIPTION

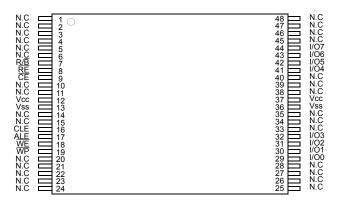
Offered in 32Mx8bit , the K9F5608X0D is 256M bit with spare 8M bit capacity. The device is offered in 1.8V, 2.7V, 3.3V Vcc. Its NAND cell provides the most cost-effective solution for the solid state mass storage market. A program operation can be performed in typical $200\mu s$ on a 528-byte page and an erase operation can be performed in typical 2ms on a 16K-byte block. Data in the page can be read out at 50ns cycle time per byte. The I/O pins serve as the ports for address and data input/output as well as command input. The on-chip write control automates all program and erase functions including pulse repetition, where required, and internal verification and margining of data. Even the write-intensive systems can take advantage of the K9F5608X0D's extended reliability of 100K program/erase cycles by providing ECC(Error Correcting Code) with real time mapping-out algorithm.

The K9F5608X0D is an optimum solution for large nonvolatile storage applications such as solid state file storage and other portable applications requiring non-volatility.




PIN CONFIGURATION (TSOP1)






PIN CONFIGURATION (FBGA)




PACKAGE DIMENSIONS




PIN CONFIGURATION (WSOP1)

PIN DESCRIPTION

| Pin NAME | Pin Function |

Figure 1-1. K9F5608X0D FUNCTIONAL BLOCK DIAGRAM





Figure 2-1. K9F5608X0D ARRAY ORGANIZATION

PRODUCT INTRODUCTION

The K9F5608X0D is a 264Mbit(276,824,064 bit) memory organized as 65,536 rows(pages) by 528 columns. Spare eight columns are located from column address of 512~527. A 528-byte data register is connected to memory cell arrays accommodating data transfer between the I/O buffers and memory during page read and page program operations. The memory array is made up of 16 cells that are serially connected to form a NAND structure. Each of the 16 cells resides in a different page. A block consists of two NAND structured strings. A NAND structure consists of 16 cells. Total 135168 NAND cells reside in a block. The array organization is shown in Figure 2-1. The program and read operations are executed on a page basis, while the erase operation is executed on a block basis. The memory array consists of 2048 separately erasable 16K-Byte blocks. It indicates that the bit by bit erase operation is prohibited on the K9F5608X0D.

The K9F5608X0D has addresses multiplexed into 8 I/Os. This scheme dramatically reduces pin counts while providing high performance and allows systems upgrades to future densities by maintaining consistency in system board design. Command, address and data are all written through I/O's by bringing $\overline{\text{WE}}$ to low while $\overline{\text{CE}}$ is low. Data is latched on the rising edge of $\overline{\text{WE}}$. Command Latch Enable(CLE) and Address Latch Enable(ALE) are used to multiplex command and address respectively, via the I/O pins. Some commands require one bus cycle. For example, Reset command, Read command, Status Read command, etc require just one cycle bus. Some other commands like Page Program and Copy-back Program and Block Erase, require two cycles: one cycle for setup and the other cycle for execution. The 32M-byte physical space requires 24 addresses, thereby requiring three cycles for word-level addressing: column address, low row address and high row address, in that order. Page Read and Page Program need the same three address cycles following the required command input. In Block Erase operation, however, only the two row address cycles are used. Device operations are selected by writing specific commands into the command register. Table 1 defines the specific commands of the K9F5608X0D.

The device includes one block sized OTP(One Time Programmable), which can be used to increase system security or to provide identification capabilities. Detailed information can be obtained by contact with Samsung.

NAND Flash Technical Notes

Initial Invalid Block(s)

Initial invalid blocks are defined as blocks that contain one or more initial invalid bits whose reliability is not guaranteed by Samsung. The information regarding the initial invalid block(s) is so called as the initial invalid block information. Devices with initial invalid block(s) have the same quality level as devices with all valid blocks and have the same AC and DC characteristics. An initial invalid block(s) does not affect the performance of valid block(s) because it is isolated from the bit line and the common source line by a select transistor. The system design must be able to mask out the invalid block(s) via address mapping. The 1st block, which is placed on 00h block address, is guaranteed to be a valid block, does not require Error Correction up to 1K Program/Erase cycles.

Identifying Initial Invalid Block(s)




Figure 3. Flow chart to create initial invalid block table.

All device locations are erased(FFh) except locations where the initial invalid block(s) information is written prior to shipping. The initial invalid block(s) status is defined by the 6th byte in the spare area. Samsung makes sure that either the 1st or 2nd page of every initial invalid block has non-FFh data at the column address of 517. Since the initial invalid block information is also erasable in most cases, it is impossible to recover the information once it has been erased. Therefore, the system must be able to recognize the initial invalid block(s) based on the initial invalid block information and create the initial invalid block table via the following suggested flow chart(Figure 3). Any intentional erasure of the initial invalid block information is prohibited.


Within its life time, the additional invalid blocks may develop with NAND Flash memory. Refer to the qualification report for the actual data. The following possible failure modes should be considered to implement a highly reliable system. In the case of status read failure after erase or program, block replacement should be done. Because program status fail during a page program does not affect the data of the other pages in the same block, block replacement can be executed with a page-sized buffer by finding an erased empty block and reprogramming the current target data and copying the rest of the replaced block. In case of Read, ECC must be employed. To improve the efficiency of memory space, it is recommended that the read or verification failure due to single bit error be reclaimed by ECC without any block replacement. The said additional block failure rate does not include those reclaimed blocks.

Program Flow Chart






Erase Flow Chart

Pointer Operation of K9F5608X0D(X8)

Samsung NAND Flash has three address pointer commands as a substitute for the two most significant column addresses. '00h' command sets the pointer to 'A' area(0~255byte), '01h' command sets the pointer to 'B' area(256~511byte), and '50h' command sets the pointer to 'C' area(512~527byte). With these commands, the starting column address can be set to any of a whole page(0~527byte). '00h' or '50h' is sustained until another address pointer command is inputted. '01h' command, however, is effective only for one operation. After any operation of Read, Program, Erase, Reset, Power_Up is executed once with '01h' command, the address pointer returns to 'A' area by itself. To program data starting from 'A' or 'C' area, '00h' or '50h' command must be inputted before '80h' command is written. A complete read operation prior to '80h' command is not necessary. To program data starting from 'B' area, '01h' command must be inputted right before '80h' command is written.






Figure 4. Block Diagram of Pointer Operation


(1) Command input sequence for programming 'A' area

(3) Command input sequence for programming 'C' area






System Interface Using CE don't-care.

For an easier system interface, $\overline{\text{CE}}$ may be inactive during the data-loading or sequential data-reading as shown below. The internal 528byte page registers are utilized as seperate buffers for this operation and the system design gets more flexible. In addition, for voice or audio applications which use slow cycle time on the order of u-seconds, de-activating $\overline{\text{CE}}$ during the data-loading and reading would provide significant savings in power consumption.


Figure 6. Program Operation with CE don't-care.





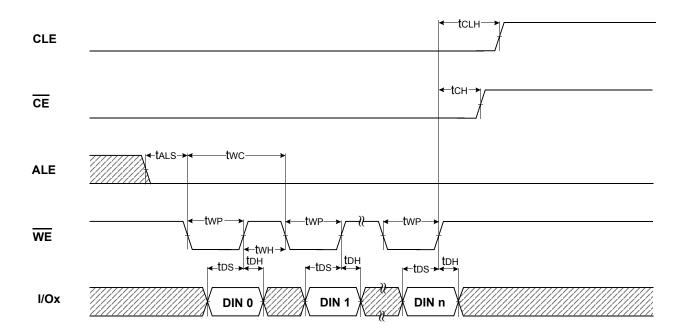
Command Latch Cycle




Address Latch Cycle




Read1 Operation (Read One Page)





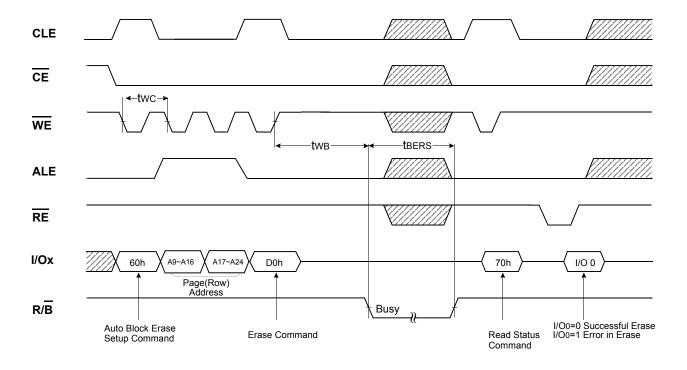
Page Program Operation





DEVICE OPERATION

PAGE READ


Upon initial device power up, the device defaults to Read1 mode. This operation is also initiated by writing 00h to the command register along with three address cycles. Once the command is latched, it does not need to be written for the following page read operation. Two types of operations are available: random read, serial page read.

The random read mode is enabled when the page address is changed. The 528 byte of data within the selected page are transferred to the data registers in less than $15\mu s(tR)$. The system controller can detect the completion of this data transfer(tR) by analyzing the output of R/B pin. Once the data in a page is loaded into the registers, they may be read out in 50ns cycle time by sequentially pulsing RE. High to low transitions of the RE clock output the data starting from the selected column address up to the last column address. The way the Read1 and Read2 commands work is like a pointer set to either the main area or the spare area. Addresses A0-A3 set the starting address of the spare area while addresses A4-A7 are ignored . The Read1 command is needed to move the pointer back to the main area. Figures 8,9 show typical sequence and timings for each read operation.

Sequential Row Read is available only on K9F5608U0D_P,F or K9F5608B0D_P:




Figure 8-1. Sequential Row Read1 Operation (only for K9F5608U0D_P,F or K9F5608B0D_P)





Figure 9-1. Sequential Row Read2 Operation (only for K9F5608U0D_P,F or K9F5608B0D_P)

After the data of last column address is clocked out, the next page is automatically selected for sequential row read. Waiting $15\mu s$ again allows reading the selected page. The sequential row read operation is terminated by bringing \overline{CE} high. Unless the operation is aborted, the page address is automatically incremented for sequential row read as in Read1 operation and spare sixteen bytes of each page may be sequentially read. The Sequential Read 1 and 2 operations are allowed only within a block and after the last page of a block being readout, the sequential read operation must be terminated by bringing \overline{CE} high. When the page address moves onto the next block, read command and address must be given. Figures 8-1, 9-1 show typical sequence and timings for sequential row read operation.

Figure 9. Read2 Operation




PAGE PROGRAM

The device is programmed basically on a page basis, but it does allow multiple partial page programing of a byte/word or consecutive bytes/words up to 528, in a single page program cycle. The number of consecutive partial page programming operation within the same page without an intervening erase operation should not exceed 2 for main array and 3 for spare array. The addressing may be done in any random order in a block. A page program cycle consists of a serial data loading period in which up to 528 bytes of data may be loaded into the page register, followed by a non-volatile programming period where the loaded data is programmed into the appropriate cell. About the pointer operation, please refer to the attached technical notes.


Figure 10. Program Operation

The serial data loading period begins by inputting the Serial Data Input command(80h), followed by the three cycle address input and then serial data loading. The words other than those to be programmed do not need to be loaded. The Page Program confirm command(10h) initiates the programming process. Writing 10h alone without previously entering the serial data will not initiate the programming process. The internal write controller automatically executes the algorithms and timings necessary for program and verify, thereby freeing the system controller for other tasks. Once the program process starts, the Read Status Register command may be entered, with RE and CE low, to read the status register. The system controller can detect the completion of a program cycle by monitoring the R/B output, or the Status bit(I/O 6) of the Status Register. Only the Read Status command and Reset command are valid while programming is in progress. When the Page Program is complete, the Write Status Bit(I/O 0) may be checked(Figure 10). The internal write verify detects only errors for "1"s that are not successfully programmed to "0"s. The command register remains in Read Status command mode until another valid command is written to the command register.

COPY-BACK PROGRAM

The copy-back program is configured to quickly and efficiently rewrite data stored in one page within the array to another page within the same array without utilizing an external memory. Since the time-consuming sequently-reading and its re-loading cycles are removed, the system performance is improved. The benefit is especially obvious when a portion of a block is updated and the rest of the block also need to be copied to the newly assigned free block. The operation for performing a copy-back is a sequential execution of page-read without burst-reading cycle and copying-program with the address of destination page. A normal read operation with "00h" command with the address of the source page moves the whole 528bytes data into the internal buffer. As soon as the Flash returns to Ready state, copy-back programming command "8Ah" may be given with three address cycles of target page followed. The data stored in the internal buffer is then programmed directly into the memory cells of the destination page. Once the Copy-Back Program is finished, any additional partial page programming into the copied pages is prohibited before erase. Since the memory array is internally partitioned into two different planes, copy-back program is allowed only within the same memory plane. Thus, A14, the plane address, of source and destination page address must be the same. "When there is a program-failure at Copy-Back operation, error is reported by pass/fail status. But if the soure page has a bit error for charge loss, accumulated copy-back operations could also accumulate bit errors. For this reason, two bit ECC is recommended for copy-back operation."

Figure 11. Copy-Back Program Operation






BLOCK ERASE

The Erase operation is done on a block basis. Block address loading is accomplished in two cycles initiated by an Erase Setup command(60h). Only address A14 to A24 is valid while A9 to A13 is ignored. The Erase Confirm command(D0h) following the block address loading initiates the internal erasing process. This two-step sequence of setup followed by execution command ensures that memory contents are not accidentally erased due to external noise conditions.

At the rising edge of $\overline{\text{WE}}$ after the erase confirm command input, the internal write controller handles erase and erase-verify. When the erase operation is completed, the Write Status Bit(I/O 0) may be checked. Figure 12 details the sequence.

READ STATUS

The device contains a Status Register which may be read to find out whether program or erase operation is completed, and whether the program or erase operation is completed successfully. After writing 70h command to the command register, a read cycle outputs the content of the Status Register to the I/O pins on the falling edge of \overline{CE} or \overline{RE} , whichever occurs last. This two line control allows the system to poll the progress of each device in multiple memory connections even when R/\overline{B} pins are common-wired. \overline{RE} or \overline{CE} does not need to be toggled for updated status. Refer to table 4 for specific Status Register definitions. The command register remains in Status Read mode until further commands are issued to it. Therefore, if the status register is read during a random read cycle, a read command(00h or 50h) should be given before sequential page read cycle.



READ ID

The device contains a product identification mode, initiated by writing 90h to the command register, followed by an address input of 00h. Two read cycles sequentially output the manufacture code(ECh), and the device code respectively. The command register remains in Read ID mode until further commands are issued to it. Figure 13 shows the operation sequence.

RESET

The device offers a reset feature, executed by writing FFh to the command register. When the device is in Busy state during random read, program or erase mode, the reset operation will abort these operations. The contents of memory cells being altered are no longer valid, as the data will be partially programmed or erased. The command register is cleared to wait for the next command, and the Status Register is cleared to value C0h when $\overline{\text{WP}}$ is high. Refer to table 5 for device status after reset operation. If the device is already in reset state a new reset command will not be accepted by the command register. The R/\overline{B} pin transitions to low for tRST after the Reset command is written. Refer to Figure 14 below.

Figure 14. RESET Operation



READY/BUSY





Figure 15. Rp vs tr ,tf & Rp vs ibusy

The device has a R/\overline{B} output that provides a hardware method of indicating the completion of a page program, erase and random read completion. The R/\overline{B} pin is normally high but transitions to low after program or erase command is written to the command register or random read is started after address loading. It returns to high when the internal controller has finished the operation. The pin is an open-drain driver thereby allowing two or more R/\overline{B} outputs to be Or-tied. Because pull-up resistor value is related to $tr(R/\overline{B})$ and current drain during busy(ibusy) , an appropriate value can be obtained with the following reference chart(Fig 15). Its value can be determined by the following guidance.

Data Protection & Power up sequence

The device is designed to offer protection from any involuntary program/erase during power-transitions. An internal voltage detector disables all functions whenever Vcc is below about 1.1V(1.8V device), 1.8V(2.7V device), 2V(3.3V device). $\overline{\text{WP}}$ pin provides hardware protection and is recommended to be kept at V_{IL} during power-up and power-down and recovery time of minimum 10 μ s is required before internal circuit gets ready for any command sequences as shown in Figure 16. The two step command sequence for program/erase provides additional software protection.
